

to Ms. Hazle and Ms. Brenda for helping me with the "Chapter Store". Rosebud Genna Maxwell did her part by keeping up with the little Thorns running amuck.

Ms. Brenda, Tabitha, and I were invited to Mrs. DePaul's 4th grade class at East Hickman Elementary school to give a talk on "First Person Impersonation". The students were extremely eager to learn about the Civil War days as well as how to use props and how to speak in first person. Mrs. Lula Brown Henry, portrayed by Ms. Brenda, gave an example of first person impersonation by impersonating her GG Grandmother, whose husband was scathed at Perryville, KY and severely wounded at Murfreesboro. He served with the 24th Tennessee Infantry, Co I and was shot in the leg, rendering him feeble for the rest of his life. Once



he healed somewhat, he continued with the unit until the end of the war. . . The children were so mesmerized with the story that they forgot that she was in "first person" and began asking questions about her husband and how the Confederate doctors medically treated him and his wounds. It was astonishing how the kids were so inquisitive.

More Information on the Topic

The event is an evening with Edwin C. Bearss wherein Ed will retell the story richly described in his book "Rebel Victory at Vicksburg." His talk is about the 1862 Siege of Vicksburg, Mississippi, or the FIRST Vicksburg Campaign, which predated Grant's Vicksburg victory by nearly a full year. It is the story of the grim determination of the Confederate soldiers, sailors and marines who broke the siege and unleashed the ironclad gunboat, CSS Arkansas, against the overwhelming but equally determined naval forces of future admirals Farragut and Davis and a detachment of The Army of the Gulf under Major General Benjamin Butler. The Confederate success at Vicksburg in 1862 prolonged the war for the control of the Mississippi River for at least one more year and greatly uplifted hopes for the survival of a new Southern nation.
