CIVIL WAR ODDITIES

To avoid the draft, Civil War recruits devised some ingenious schemes to fool the examining physicians. One of the more frequent frauds involved pretending one had a hernia. It was easy for a doctor to spot a recruit wearing a truss upside down or backwards, but the technique of blowing air through small punctures in the scrotum was harder to detect.

Self-inflicted mutilations were in some cases used to escape the draft. Fingers and toes were intentionally cut off and when it was discovered that the army reauired good teeth prerequisite for induction, there suddenly appeared an uncommon number of draftees without theirs. The Army put great emphasis on the quality of teeth because a soldier had to bite off the end of his paper cartridge in order to fire his weapon. Also, the basic food ration known as hardtack was difficult to chew without good molars.

Physicians documented cases of men who tried to create disqualifying symptoms by artificial means. Chronic eye diseases were often due to the presence of sand or cayenne pepper underneath the eyelids. Skin diseases were created by applying hot lye or sulfuric acid to an area of the body. Tightly binding an arm or leg for several hours would produce simulated varicose veins. Applying croton oil or cayenne pepper to the anus produced hemorrhoids.

A draftee once appeared before san examining with a specimen of his urine which, on analysis, seemed to indicate that the man was dying of Bright's disease. He was requested to provided to provide another specimen in the presence of the doctor, and it was then that he confessed his deception. The urine he had submitted was really that of a dying friend.

Several examining physicians reported being offered bribes. One draftee attempted to bribe an examining doctor with "favors from [his] female friends." Dr. William W. Mayo, father of the brothers who founded the Mayo Clinic, was dismissed from the Federal service because of a scandal involving a bribe.

In contrast to those attempting to escape army service, there were men who did all they could to enlist by disguising their ages or illnesses.

A physician's examination of an underweight recruit revealed the soles of his shoes to be made of lead. Ice packs applied to a hernia for a day or two before a physical would cause the hernias to recede.

In order to appear younger, old men would dye their hair, shave their beards and camouflage their false teeth by staining them with tobacco juice. Young boys of thirteen or fourteen would write the number 18 on a piece of paper and place it in the soles of their shoes. They would then appear before the recruiting officer to be sworn in, and in good conscience raise the right hand and swear that they were "over eighteen."

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Duckman's Gumbo

1 chicken (4.5 - 5 lb)

1 onion, cut in quarts

1 carrot

1 t. salt

1 bay leaf

1 lb smoked sausage (Andouille or kielbase)

1 duck breast

1 c. vegetable oil

3/4 c. flour

2 c. onions, chopped

2 c. green bell pepper, chopped

1 ½ - 2 T. Tony Chachere's Creole seasoning

1 (15oz) can diced tomatoes

1 (14.5 oz) can ro-tel tomatoes

1 (1 lb.) pkg. frozen okra

1 t. gumbo file'

- 1. Cover chicken in 4 quarts water; add onion, carrot, salt and bay leaf. Cook until meat comes off bone. Pull meat from bones and set aside. Reserve the broth for later use. Do this the day before you start to make the gumbo.
- 2. Slice sausage into rings and set aside. Cut duck breast into small cubes. Set aside.
- 3. To make the roux: In an iron skillet; heat oil over medium high heat until just before it starts to smoke: add flour. With a long handled whisk, whisk constantly until it is a caramel color. Watch carefully; it burns easily. Add onions and bell pepper cook for about 5 minutes. Add chicken and sausage and duck. Add about 4 cups of the reserved chicken broth to mixture. Season with Tony Chachere's Creole Seasoning. Simmer about 1 1/2 hour. Add tomatoes and okra. Simmer 1 hour. Add file' and stir well.
- 4. Serve over rice.

Serves 8-10

Note: Add broth as needed
